




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FOREWORD

To the near north of Australia lie three of the world's many conflict-ridden countries - Bougainville, East Timor and West Papua. They contain some of the most spectacular beauty and most productive land in the world and should be areas of peace, culture and sustainability.

It is not a coincidence that each contains a resource in great demand in the affluent world - copper in Bougainville; gold in West Papua; oil in the Timor Gap. The rapaciousness of the mining companies and the colonial governments which support them; including militarily, leaves no room for the limited aspirations of the indigenous peoples.

Attempts by the indigenous peoples to protect their environment and culture and to benefit from the resource exploitation of their land have resulted in violent repression. This has been most brutal and calculated in East Timor where approximately 20 per cent of the population have been killed by the Indonesian military forces over the past two decades.

In Bougainville, the killings clearly number thousands but, in addition, the surviving population is forced to live in the most difficult circumstances. Normal food production is sabotaged, resulting in starvation and undernourishment. Health services are almost non-existent with no doctors, few nurses and virtually no medicines. Many people have been forced away from their villages into the more sheltered mountains, often living in caves. Unfortunately, among the many international trouble spots, Bougainville is of little strategic importance to the major global powers and rates little attention in international fora. The undisciplined PNG military forces are allowed to perpetrate their crimes with little international condemnation.

Marilyn Havini is one of a number of brave, dedicated individuals who work tirelessly to call the attention of the world to the tragic situation in Bougainville. Her documentation of human rights abuses in Bougainville has been an invaluable resource for politicians, negotiators and activists for the present and, hopefully, a record for addressing justice issues in the future.

Australians, in particular, cannot turn a blind eye to the tragedy of Bougainville. Apart from its proximity, Australia is the country with the closest ties to PNG and its major military ally. We provide military advisors and equipment which have, undoubtedly, contributed to the skills and resources of PNG forces in Bougainville. The use of Australian-made Iroquois helicopters as gun ships and for the disposal of bodies at sea is the most infamous example of our complicity.

It is hard to understand how we have allowed this previously beautiful, abundant, peaceful country to be reduced to terror, impoverishment and disease. It is only possible while we maintain the delusion that Bougainvilleans are, somehow, different and less human than ourselves.

The real truth is that it is the perpetrators of this tragedy, and the people who stand aside and allow it to continue who are less than human, not the unfortunate victims. Even less human is the system of greed and overconsumption that places more importance on resources than people.

I hope that the production of this second volume of Marilyn's list jolts the world out of its apathy and forces the PNG Government to seek a peaceful resolution of the conflict. The people of Bougainville have suffered too much and must be allowed to return to their villages, families and peace.

If we cannot resolve this conflict, it augers poorly for the next century when countries will be disputing over scarce resources such as water and energy. The future of humanity is bleak unless we face the true nature of the behaviour which lies just below our thin veneer of morality.

Radio Free Bougainville continues to transmit under very difficult conditions with technical assistance from the Australia-based International Amateur Radio Network (I.A.R.N.). This remains the main link from behind a island blockade to the outside world. Most of the Bougainville Interim Government press releases I have sourced in this publication have come from transcripts of community broadcasts and relayed messages over RFB. To balance the information from the people on the ground, we have the PNG government reports and the PNG based media (mainly radio and newspapers). Unfortunately the restrictions placed on travel to Bougainville by the military blockade severely limits the press in gaining direct access to witness the events they report. Thus we are all effectively forced to report or print information by hearsay except for a few brav concerned individuals including journalists and activists who have risked their lives and freedom to get the evidence on film. Radio broadcasts and print media can attempt the task of reaching others with the news of Bougainville but, for the sceptics, they cannot compete with the daily graphic telecast news images provided by photojournalists of other more accessible major world conflicts.

However, the United Nations has been followed by several churches, unions and non-governmental human rights organisations in keeping watch on developments in Papua New Guinea and Bougainville. I acknowledge the valuable roles they play and the contributions they make to the monitoring, negotiations and efforts promoting a peace process.



INTRODUCTION

This is a compilation of human rights abuses committed against the people of Bougainville, in the current armed conflict now, in 1996, in its eighth-year.

A situation of war oppresses the civilians. War crimes and crimes against humanity, including genocide, have been committed on Bougainville's population. It is standard procedure that anyone may bring a human rights problem to the attention of the United Nations. Thousands of people around the world do this every year.

In 1967 the Economic and Social Council gave authorisation to the Commission on Human Rights and the Protection of Minorities to 'examine information relevant to gross violations of human rights and fundamental freedoms...in all countries'. The Council also directed that, where appropriate, it could 'make a thorough study of situations which reveal a consistent pattern of violation of human rights' (*also known as 1503 Procedure*) affecting a large number of people over a protracted period of time; report, and make recommendations on these violations to the Council (*Ecosoc Res 1235 (XLII) 6 June 1967*).

The Commission on Human Rights works directly with countries where human rights violations have been alleged to have occurred.

During the passage of five (5) Bougainville UN Resolutions (2 Subcommission and 3 UNCHR) passed since 1992, the Government of Papua New Guinea has failed miserably to address the violation of human rights by its forces on Bougainville.

Under its obligation as a member state of the United Nations, Papua New Guinea must communicate such information to the Commission Human Rights Committee. It has clearly failed to do this. Such abrogation of responsibility has therefore challenged ordinary citizens such as myself who care for the protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms to continue to raise the human rights violations on Bougainville. This work is a continuation of the compilation I began in 1994.

Volume 2 is an update of new accounts committed within the past 12 months up to and including May 10 1996. Previous unreported and unlisted accounts dating back to 1989 have also been included.

The original 21-page document was prepared as a sample to accompany the Justice Issues paper written for the October 1994 Peace Conference which could not be presented in Arawa when the conference was aborted. Bougainvillean who saw the list began to cry for grief of their own untold suffering and loss. Word reached me from Bougainville that the people are depending on those of us who are outside both the blockade and PNG occupation to act for them in exposing their plight. Bougainvillean continue to appeal to their kindred and leaders to put their case for them and they rely on our interventions.

The first compilation thus expanded into a 50-page volume in 1995 as I had opportunity with time to include the personal accounts from taped interviews with survivors; other documents researched from official doctor's reports; government and non-government reports including agencies such as the Red Cross, Amnesty International and the World Council of Churches. I attempted to review newspaper articles dating back over 7 years.

Eye witnesses came forward to show me their own diary entries and other documents including individual accounts that they carried with them as they fled the troubled island.

When news spread of my work and an increasing demand for copies of this list grew beyond my photocopying powers, I was assisted by concerned supporters in the Bougainville Freedom Movement to publish the list as a compilation. More than 100 copies have been printed since Meredith Burgmann MLC sponsored the launching of what has been dubbed 'Marilyn's List' at NSW State Parliament House on 1st May 1995.

A dramatic reading of excerpts from accounts in each year of the conflict (1989-1995) by Australian women invited to the launch reminded those present of the reality of a war that in the words of two Resolutions passed by the UN Sub-Commission for the Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities, (1992/19 and 1994/21) 'expressed concern that the long-lasting conflict on Bougainville is the most violent crisis in the Pacific region since the Pacific Island states became independent.'

In June 1995 a copy was lodged with the United Nations Human Rights Office in Geneva Switzerland. The Special Rapporteur on extrajudicial, summary and arbitrary executions was preparing to fulfil the 19 August 1994 UNCHR Resolution 1994/8(XXIII): Item 5

'...to investigate reports of torture and extra judicial, summary and arbitrary executions in Bougainville'. (one of six items in the fourth of five Resolutions ...1992/19; 1993/76; 1994/81; 1994/21; 1995/65...'

passed since delegations of Bougainvilleans have been submitting accounts of human rights violations to the United Nations Sub-Commission on Human Rights and the United Nations Commission on Human Rights since mid-1991.

Mr Bacre Waly N'daiye, the Special Rapporteur, requested extra copies of the compilation for reference in his investigations during his subsequent visit to Papua New Guinea and Bougainville 21 to 28 October 1995. The visit was intended to examine the situation of the right to life, in particular on the island of Bougainville. He was accompanied by the United Nations Special Procedures Officer Mrs Neela Ghai. His findings, conclusions and recommendations with regard to the visit can be found in the 22-page second addendum to the report:

E/CN.4/1996/4/Add.2; tabled under Item 10 of the Question of Violations of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms in any part of the World, with particular reference to Colonial and other Dependent Countries and Territories, at the fifty-second session of the UNCHR in March /April 1996.

Following local and overseas requests for copies of 'Marilyn's List' by Amnesty International, Pax Christi, World Council of Churches, Medecins Sans Frontieres, International Red Cross, International Commission of Jurists and many other organisations, Volume 1 was presented to the Senate in Parliament House, Canberra, Australia on 26 September 1995 by Senator Christobel Chamarette.

Leave was granted for 'Marilyn's List' to be tabled in the Adjournment Session of the Senate, and the Compilation has been incorporated into the Parliament's Current Senate Hansard, Page 1472; accompanied by a Pax Christi statement that the Senator quoted before reading a personal letter I had received from Bougainville. Senator Chamarette commended the Compilation to the Senate and tabled my written statement in explanation for the publication of the book.

The Compilation has thus proven a valuable document in informing Governments and National Delegations as well as the numerous human rights bodies that are concerned for the welfare of Bougainville. It also serves as an indicator of the ongoing nature of abuses and identifies where possible the antagonists in the conflict and emphasises the unrelenting scale of perpetration.

To document the accounts contained in this volume has been a deeply moving experience. I cannot type details of massacres and horror without pausing to hear the cries of those suffering individuals whose lives are delineated here in such meagre detail.

In this compilation I have attempted accurately to record events as described. It is the voice of the community of Bougainville, joined at other times by witnesses or various people involved in the crisis. I have organised the material into a comprehensive format but have not altered any information that has come to hand from documents, interviews or printed accounts. The description and detail of each alleged violation as expressed in the accounts remain faithful to the original reports and sources irrespective of my own views or other information that exists from differing accounts. The responsibility for information as contained in each entry must remain with the original source that has been identified in the left-hand column.

My reason for listing several accounts of an event where they exist, is to acknowledge each and every version supplied for future verification in the search for truth. Several witnessed accounts may prove complementary to each other and may be of use in searching out further information. All accounts must be heard in the hope that inaccuracies can be amended, false reports exposed and accurate ones further substantiated.

This document is only the first stage in collating primary material - it is not possible to authenticate or verify the allegations. Therefore it is necessary to include every reputable account as supplied without bias. In spite of some criticism of Volume 1 regarding the apparent emphasis on PNGDF atrocities I have yet to receive any subsequent submissions or differing accounts to Volume 1 apart from those found in the Addendum in this new publication.

I have spoken with PNG media reporters, BTG and Resistance Commanders by phone and at conferences and negotiations and have encouraged them to submit their own details of events, but have received no replies.

In the compilation work for this second volume, I have written and faxed requests for further information to reporters of media in Papua New Guinea, the Solomon Islands and overseas reporters who have travelled to any area of the conflict. However, it must be remembered that the voices from these pages are mostly unknown civilians in a community that has been successfully shut away from the prying eyes of the world by an effective wall of conspiratorial silence.

The accounts of human rights abuses are by no means definitive. In fact many entries are sketchy. Omissions from even the most detailed accounts become obvious when extracting the information for tabulation purposes from the primary source materials.

I will continue to collect and collate all new material received, including details or supporting documents to the original accounts or, alternatively, reputable counter reports of abuses to include in further updates.

It is significant that action has now been taken by the United Nations Commission on Human Rights subsequent to the 46th session, *Resolution 1994/8(XXIII)*, where members of the Commission reaffirmed the obligation that all states have to promote and protect human rights and fundamental freedoms that are necessary for a just and lasting peace on Bougainville:

'The Commission on Human Rights, being guided by the relevant provisions of the Charter of the United Nations, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the International Covenant on Human Rights, has approved by consensus vote Resolutions 1993/76, 1994/21, and 1995/48 in which the Government of Papua New Guinea was urged to promptly send the Special Rapporteur on extrajudicial, summary, or arbitrary executions to investigate the reports of human rights violations on Bougainville.'

Despite his regret at 'the unforeseen technical difficulties that prevented him from visiting the central area of Bougainville', the Special Rapporteur transmitted to the Government of Papua New Guinea a list of 75 cases of alleged extrajudicial, summary or arbitrary executions that included 6 women and 6 children. These were cases that he specifically drew to the attention of the PNG Government with the hope that the Government would investigate the alleged killings perpetrated by the PNGDF; with the resulting apprehension and trial of the relevant suspects.

As brief as the main report was in regard to the page 89 listing of 75 cases of extrajudicial, summary and arbitrary executions, Mr. Bacre Waly N'diaye noted with regret that at the time his report was finalised (despite the PNG Government's invitation for Mr. N'diaye's visit and its willingness to cooperate with his mandate) no reply had been received from the State of Papua New Guinea as to the allegations transmitted.

Although more detailed accounts of the 75 are scattered through Volume 1 of 'Marilyn's List', I include the Special Rapporteur's entry in my Addendum for comparison of slight differences in name spelling, ages of victims in some cases and confirmation of the findings of an impartial investigator having heard first hand the same tragic accounts as my compilation has gathered.

The Special Rapporteur's efforts in collecting information that would provide a true and factual coverage of the situation in Bougainville are commendable. They enabled him to write the detailed report for the 1996 UNCHR. This report is well worth reading; and his concluding remarks, particular concerns and recommendations provide a very serious challenge for the sake of fundamental human rights and freedom for Bougainville.

In the introduction of the 2nd Addendum to the Special Rapporteur's report, Mr N'diaye gave a comprehensive account of his itinerary:

'On his way to Papua New Guinea, the Special Rapporteur had stopped in Sydney, Australia, where he had meetings with victims of violations of human rights from the island of Bougainville, officials of Amnesty International, representatives of the International Commission of Jurists, representatives of the Bougainville Revolutionary Army and individuals who have first hand-knowledge and experience of the situation of human rights on the island of Bougainville.'

'In Port Moresby, the capital of PNG, the Special Rapporteur had meetings with the Prime Minister, Sir Julius Chan, and officials of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, and the Ministry of Justice, as well as with the Chief Justice, the Chief of the Ombudsman Commission, officials of the Correctional Services and the Chief of Staff, Papua New Guinea Defence Force. Meetings were also held with the Chief of the PNGDF.'

'Also in Port Moresby, the Special Rapporteur met with families of victims of violations of human rights, including extrajudicial, summary and arbitrary executions, representatives of non-governmental organisations working in the field of human rights and United Nations specialised agencies concerned with delivering humanitarian aid, and individuals.'

'During the period from 24 to 26 October 1995, meetings were held in Buka (the small island at the north-western tip of the island of Bougainville) with the Premier and officials of the Bougainville Transitional Government, representatives of women's groups, representatives of church groups, former officials of the previous provincial administration and individuals who were victims of violations of human rights. Several of those interviewed had come from the main island of Bougainville.'

'The visit scheduled for 25 October 1995 to the central part of Bougainville, under the control of the BRA, ie. Sipuru, Panguna and surrounding areas, could not take place because of mechanical problems which developed with the only operational and available helicopter, and because of unfavourable weather conditions.'

'After returning to Port Moresby, on 26 October 1995, a further attempt to visit the central part of Bougainville on 28 October 1995 was negotiated with all parties concerned, as the helicopter had meanwhile been repaired. However, the proposed plan had to be abandoned after the Special Rapporteur was informed by officials of the Bougainville Interim Government (BIG) (dissidents in exile in Honiara, Solomon Islands) that the large numbers of people who had previously gathered in

Sipuru to meet the Special Rapporteur had returned to their respective villages and also because the weather conditions would be unfavourable for travel by helicopter on the proposed day.'

Notably absent from this detailed list is any mention of a Papua New Guinea human rights commission. I understand that Papua New Guinea delegations to the United Nations have for three years been assuring the UNCHR that such a necessary authority was being established in Papua New Guinea, yet the evidence seems to suggest otherwise. The Special Rapporteur reports on page 15 that

'in the absence of a human rights commission, only the Ombudsman Commission can play a role, at present, in assisting with investigations of violations of human rights. Until such time as a commission of human rights is established, the international community can play an important role in assisting with the peace negotiations and in conflict resolution.'

On page 20 of his report, the Special Rapporteur

'urges the Papua New Guinea authorities to establish transparency and a system of public reporting on human rights issues.'

I would welcome such a system and believe it would be for the humanity of not only Bougainville but also for Papua New Guinea and the surrounding nations that are embroiled in the conflict whether by choice or responsibility. The blockade and the war has been politically manufactured. Bougainvilleans have been silenced by cancelled passports, refusal of exit and entry visas, diplomatic pressure to deny freedom of movement or expression to and from neighbouring countries; demands or attempts at extradition by Papua New Guinea of the handful of brave Bougainvillean individuals and their supporters who continue to challenge this political and military blockade. In this compilation I have not detailed these violations and threats under which even my own family is living.

Other Bougainvilleans have been sacked from employment, tortured or detained, held for months in PNG gaols on suspicion of crimes; falsely accused and convicted of crimes. Papua New Guineans that are of a darker skin colour than their fellows are frequently mistaken for Bougainvilleans and are subject to many of these same abuses under a cultural 'payback' system by misguided individuals.

I know of many cases by verbal accounts that I could not include without original source or documentation. The Special Rapporteur, in paragraph 72 of Addendum 2, pointed out several remedies under the judicial system that would address these issues.

Suffice it to say I understand why there are so few of us prepared to 'go public' and risk the vilification of the Papua New Guinea state that is more concerned with exonerating itself than facing up to a grave human error. A whole new assessment is required to achieve some semblance of justice.

CATEGORIES OF HUMAN RIGHTS ABUSES

Various human rights agencies recognise basic categories of abuses in the monitoring of violations. Incidents in this compilation are categorised in the following terms.

Abduction	kidnapping or preventing freedom of movement
Ambuscade	attack on villages or ambushes
Assault	physical molestation / beatings
Bombardment - Mortar	assail persistently or batter with shot and shell
Bombardment - Grenade	assail persistently or batter with shot and shell
Denied freedom of movement	loss of freedom to travel or move within or across areas at will
Denied freedom of speech	loss of freedom to communicate
Destruction of Property	this includes torching or bulldozing of villages
Detained	held by force against one's will
Dispossession of Property	theft of land or any type of possession
Divestment of Property	to deprive or deny owner of property or possession
Education Blockade	forced closure of schools
Evacuee	people fleeing danger or abandoning their homes
Extrajudicial Killing	summary or arbitrary execution without trial
Economic Blockade	denial of, or restrictions placed on goods and services
Food Blockade	denial of essential food supplies

Frustrated Murder	attempted murder where the victim survives
Harassment	intimidating, menacing or threatening tactics
Health Disaster	as a consequence of nature of war
Massacre	where three or more are killed
Medical Blockade	denial of essential medicines and life-saving medical assistance
Murder	usually refers to one or two victims killed unlawfully
Rape	sexual molestation
Strafing	indiscriminate firing of guns or gunship or gunship helicopter
Strategic Hamletting	a form of detention where people are forced into care centres or military secured zones
Torture	cruel, inhumane or degrading treatment or punishment
Violent dispersal	where people are forced to scatter, flee or meetings broken up

MARILYN TALEO HAVINI

Twenty five years ago Marilyn Taleo Havini married Bougainvillean Chief, Moses Havini. After a traditional Bougainville wedding at Buka in 1971, she lived on Bougainville for 20 years as a village clan member and came to regard the village as her true home. Marilyn speaks fluent Pidgin and some Haku, the language of Moses' clan, where she was formally adopted in a traditional assembly of Buka chiefs and given the name Taleo. A school teacher, Marilyn was Head of Visual Arts Faculties at Hutjena High School, Arawa High School and North Solomons International High School; Principal of Arawa International Preschools; and was on the Haku Curriculum Committee for Viles Tok Pies Skul. She was a founding member in 1972 of the Bougainville Women's Association and later served in the reconstituted North Solomons Women's Council. As an active Christian, she was a leader of many Church bodies.

Well known in Bougainville as a graphic artist, she designed the Bougainville flag and government material for the Bougainville and North Solomons Provincial Governments. Marilyn was widely recognised in both Bougainville and PNG as an exhibiting artist in both oils and pastels, portraying a unique insight into Bougainville culture.

Marilyn and Moses were living in Bougainville when war broke out. Now in exile, Moses is the International Representative of the Bougainville Interim Government, based in Sydney, while Marilyn teaches at a Sydney High School. Marilyn and Moses have lost more than 100 relatives and close friends in the war, now in its seventh year. Marilyn was compelled to compile this update and previous reports as a result of the appalling horror and savagery inflicted on villagers. As a Bougainville mother who has raised many children in the clan, she eagerly looks forward to returning to a peaceful Bougainville with her husband and their four children when it is safe to do so.

Marilyn has represented Bougainville alongside her husband at many conferences and human rights forums, including the UN World Conference on Human Rights in Vienna, Austria, June 1993 and the Cairns Peace Talks, December 1995.
