#### **Answer**

1. The Australian Government has supported a range of advisers, volunteers and experts to assist the Autonomous Bougainville Government (ABG) since 2010, through both PNG national sector programs and through programs specific to Bougainville. Details of advisory positions funded by AusAID in 2013 were provided in response to Question on Notice No. 306 of Supplementary Budget Estimates in November 2013. A list of current advisory positions funded by DFAT is provided in response to Question 83 below.

The precise number, role and duration of individuals assisting the ABG fluctuates over time. The annual costs vary depending on the period advisors are engaged for and the reimbursable travel costs incurred in a particular year. The Department does not maintain a separate central record of advisers engaged since 2010 from all the programs in Bougainville with costs totalled over the four year period requested. To collate such this information would entail a significant additional investment of resources. The Department does not consider this diversion of resources from priority areas to be justified.

4. Australia co-funds with New Zealand the Governance Implementation Fund (GIF). The GIF expended \$436,264.65 up to 31 October 2014 to implement the Mining Community Negotiations and Consultations Project. Forums/events conducted under the project have included:

- workshops to identify and address negotiating issues for landowners and develop an integrated negotiation position between ABG and landowners;
- workshops working with landowners to develop their negotiating skills and their capacity to effectively manage the business of their associations;
- workshops providing specific opportunities for women representatives to identify and address negotiation issues and build their capacity to influence decision making;
- organising the Bougainville-wide Women's Forum for women to receive information regarding, and have input into, preparations for the Panguna negotiations;
- establishing the Bougainville Negotiation Forum, the broadly-based stakeholder group designed to ensure that negotiations are directed by a body that has broad representation from all key Bougainville interests, including the ABG, Panguna affected landowners, ex-combatants, women's groups, churches, councils of elders, business and youth; and
- village level community engagement in the Panguna area to ensure those most affected by earlier mining operations are fully engaged in preparations for negotiations.

The GIF also funded a Mining Negotiations Adviser, Professor Ciaran O'Faircheallaigh, to support the ABG to consult and negotiate with relevant communities and stakeholders on the reopening of the Panguna Mine. Funding provided since 2010 totalled \$796,302.40, including \$19,053.97 provided by DFAT in 2011.

Australia also provided \$49,425.45 for ten senior ABG representatives, including President Momis, to attend the ABG Mining Conference in Canberra in February 2013.

Australia has also provided funding to the ABG to support the consultation process the ABG has conducted on the mining sector in Bougainville, including to engage advisers to assist, among other things, the ABG plan and conduct the public consultations.

Australia funded an ABG Strategic and Legal Advisor, Mr Anthony Regan, to advise the Bougainville Executive Council, and Chief Administrator and the Autonomous

Bougainville Government on a broad range of legal, constitutional and policy issues. This has included advice on mining policy and negotiations on re-opening the Panguna copper mine and assistance with the development of the proposed Bougainville Mining Act and interim mining legislation. Total funding for this position, including work unrelated to mining, since 2010 was \$968,120.

The majority of advisers are engaged through the Provincial and Local-level Government Program (PLGP), with others supported under the PNG Australia Law and Justice Program (PALJP); the education sector Capacity Development Facility (CDF) and the Bougainville Governance and Implementation Fund (GIF), to which the ABG and New Zealand also contribute funding.

DFAT understands that HK Logistics in turn engaged subcontractors to assist in fulfilling its contractual obligations, including Professional Services Solutions. The Department understands that Professional Services Solutions was engaged to assist in the recruitment of personnel to support the Bougainville Transition Team between June 2003 and March 2007.

Professional Services Solutions was also engaged by HK Logistics to provide the Department with the following services:

- construction and logistics project in Nauru between April 2004 and March 2007; and
- support to the Indian Ocean Tsunami (Banda Aceh) between March 2005 and June 2006.

Production and dissemination of policy relevant research about the Pacific, across the following thematic areas: Politics, Elections, Leadership & Governance; Conflict, Justice & Peace Building; Poverty, Livelihoods, Rural Development, Migration and Extractive Industries; and Gender, Health and Social Development;
    - ii. Expanding and sustaining a network of Australian, regional and international research institutions and individual researchers; and
    - iii. Training and mentoring the next generation of Pacific and Timor Leste researchers.
  - b. The key performance indicators for the SSGM program are:

## QUESTIONS ON NOTICE/IN WRITING

- i. A core research program that provides policy relevant research and analysis to the Government and stakeholders in the Pacific;
- ii. Establishment of research partnerships with key regional and international institutions (including universities, think tanks and donor programs);
- iii. Effective research communication to Government and regional stakeholders through hosting of seminars and workshops and publication of a range of research products (including research reports, discussion papers and policy briefs); and
- iv. An increased number of Pacific Island scholars collaborating on and producing peer reviewed research and analysis on relevant issues.
- c. Under the terms of the SSGM grant agreement a mid-term performance evaluation will be conducted for the current program.
- 2. The Government will have provided \$1,400,000 to the Development Policy Centre, through Crawford School of Public Policy from 2012 2015.
  - a. This funding supports:
    - i. Research and analysis to inform PNG Government budget and expenditure policy directions.
    - ii. Collaboration with the National Research Institute in PNG to undertake this research and provide mentoring and training
